




Scouting Fun Fact #18



- Did You Know?
- The Boy Scout Memorial, unveiled in 1964 in Washington, D.C., stands at the site of the 1937 First National Scout Jamboree. One of the few D.C. memorials to commemorate a living cause.
- The figures represent Manhood and Womanhood and Scouts worldwide.
 - "In grateful tribute to the men and women whose generosity, devotion, and leadership have brought Scouting to the nation's youth and to honor all members of the Boy Scouts of America who in days of peace and times of peril have done their duty to God and their country...in recognition of the fiftieth anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America."
- The memorial was constructed at no expense to the government. The funds were raised from each Scout unit and each donor signed a scroll that was placed in the pedestal of the statue.

Frostbite













Definition

- An injury caused by freezing of the skin and underlying tissues
 - Liquids within cell walls freeze
- Early stage of frostbite is called frostnip
 - A cold feeling followed by numbness
- As frostbite gets worse, affected skin may change color and become hard or waxy-looking
- Most common on fingers, toes, ears, cheeks, chin and tip of the nose
- Can be caused by direct contact with ice, freezing metals or very cold liquids









Stages

- Frostnip (Stage 1)
 - Frostnip is the early stage of frostbite. Symptoms are pain, tingling and numbness. Frostnip doesn't cause permanent damage to the skin
- Mild to moderate frostbite (Stage 2)
 - Frostbite causes slight changes in skin color. The skin may begin to feel warm. This is a sign of serious skin involvement. If you treat frostbite with rewarming at this stage, the surface of the skin may look patchy. The affected area may sting, burn and swell. A fluid-filled blister may form 12 to 36 hours after rewarming. This stage also is called superficial frostbite
- **Deep frostbite** (Stage 3)
 - As frostbite progresses, it affects all layers of the skin and the tissues below. The affected skin turns white or blue-gray. Large blood blisters may appear 24 to 48 hours after rewarming. Weeks after the injury, tissue may turn black and hard as it dies









Symptoms

- Numbness
- Tingling
- Patches of skin in shades of red, white, blue, gray, purple or brown
 - The color of affected skin depends on how serious the frostbite is and the usual skin color
- Cold, hard, waxy-looking skin
- Clumsiness due to joint stiffness
- Pain
- Blistering after rewarming









First Aid

- Get out of the cold and remove wet clothing
- If you suspect hypothermia, wrap up in a warm blanket until help arrives
- Protect the injured area from further damage
- Don't walk on frostbitten feet or toes if possible
- Place your affected skin in a bath of warm (not hot) water
- Take a pain reliever if needed
- Drink a warm, nonalcoholic beverage if possible
- Seek medical help if needed
- Do not rub affected areas!









When to seek medical help

- When Stage 2 or 3 Frostbite is present
- Frostbite patients may have hypothermia
- Medical help is necessary if
 - Intense pain even after taking a pain reliever and rewarming
 - Intense shivering
 - Slurred speech
 - Drowsiness
 - Trouble walking









Prevention

- Stay safe and warm
 - Limit time outdoors when it's freezing cold and wet or windy
 - Dress in loose layers
 - Wear a hat or headband made for cold weather. Wear socks and sock liners
 - Watch for symptoms of frostbite
 - Plan to protect yourself
 - Eat well-balanced meals and stay hydrated
- Keep moving

Roundtable Jan 9, 2025

- Lois Caipen Advancement VP of North Section GSW-Y Council
- A lot of our Advancement job is sorting out problems.... and we wondered how these problems start. A high % of our leaders are trained, but it's a deluge of info. They don't remember everything they heard.
- Tonight we are sharing best practices gleaned from the experience of our advancement committee members. Ideas for supporting advancement in your unit and recording it.









Advancement: Tips to save your Scoutmaster's Sanity

- Show you care
- Expectations for Adults and Youth
- Mechanics of data entry
- Track Rank Advancement, Track MBs
- Planning and Scheduling the whole works









Show you care

- Be friendly, demo the Scout Oath and Law.
- I know you care about all your Scouts, but the parents and Scouts may not know that. Tell them outright that you care that they feel <u>comfortable</u> here and you want them to <u>gain</u> <u>everything possible</u> during your time together.
- Let them know the 18th birthday is important and you will be tracking their progress. They may also come to think of it as important.
- Encourage parents to ask questions when they don't understand what is happening.
- Tell parents they will have more fun and be good role models for the youth if they are helping the unit leadership make it all happen.





Expectations for Adults and Youth

- Each of you is important to how the troop has fun and learns.
- Youth: Be on time, in uniform, bring Handbook, required items (newsletters & e-mails help us know what's happening this day) Be prepared for your role as Patrol Member, PL, SPL, QM, Chaplain, Historian.... Tr Guides and PLs are responsible for working with their Scouts on advancement. An experienced ASM guides these youth leaders/trainers. Possible Goal: 1st Class, 1-2 yrs.
- Adults: Be on time and prepared for your role this day. Be ready to assist if needed: YPT and Hazardous Weather. Be active in the committee and/or teach some MBs. If adults need to talk and plan, don't distract the youth and leaders.
- Y and A: Follow the <u>unit phone policy</u> during scout meetings/activities.







Mechanics of Data Entry #1

- Recruit an Advancement Chair if you can! They will see what's happening, where each Scout is, what each Scout needs next. Which camping, activities, and MBs does the troop need to provide now and in a few months?
- Everyone agreed <u>using ScoutBook is essential</u>. Your District/Zone Advancement chair can find you local help if you don't understand SB. May need to search to find the spots to record service projects, camping and hiking.
- <u>Units with and without Advancement Chairs share the</u> <u>workload</u> for advancement documentation, buying and awarding. Other adults can buy the items, help youth with the Ct of Honor.





Mechanics of Data Entry #2

 Handbooks may seem archaic, but they provide valuable backup to the computer records and the Scouts can see what is signed off and what needs to be worked on. MB workbooks are not (can not be) required, but they also provide visual feedback to the Scout. The following site seems to keep up with MB pamphlet changes: http://www.usscouts.org/mb/worksheets/list.asp
 Be aware that

National had many MB changes on Jan 1, 2025.

Some units have handbooks required every meeting, some 1x/mo. Some schedule a 'Book Work' time where Scouts write in the events, service, campouts, MBs etc. they recently completed. Some schedule a night where adult volunteers input from handbooks. Tip: Announce any handbook sessions a week in advance.







Mechanics of Data Entry #3

- Unit advancement works to have the Scout Handbooks match the computer records.
- At least one unit emails a monthly report to the parents so the Scout and the Parents know how the Scout is progressing.
- Warning: Please warn the parents to NOT share THEIR log in info with their Scout. At least one youth has gotten creative with the computer records. We are dealing with smart kids!









Track Rank Advancement & Merit Badges

- The Advancement Chair coordinates the specialists and gets the specialists to help with the records.
- SM & ASMs are responsible for Scout Skills approval, so allocate weekly Scout Book progress entries to them.
- MBCs do the MB entries. Teach them if they don't get it.
- SMs need to know they can do a <u>Scout Master conference</u> at any time the Scout might need it. Are they stalled in a rank, are they acting differently? It's a chance to check with the youth and see what we can do to help them through a rough patch. Maybe plan on 2-3 SM Conferences a year with each Scout. Show you care.









Planning and Scheduling #1

- Scouts plan a year ahead. Do the planning at a family BBQ for fun. You will get more input and buy-in.
- May still use the JTE as a guide. Ended Dec 31, 2024 but it provides many opportunities a Scout needs to participate and to advance. Plan 3-4 Courts of Honor. Award Rank advancement immediately and the card at the COH.
- For each SPL term the Scouts include an advancement goal in their objectives.
- Work with the Council and School Calendars so you include major events. Pinewood Derby, Klondikes, MB Universities, Leader Training, Brownsea, NYLT, OA Call Outs and Conclaves, Service Events, Summer Camp, Jambo, NOAC, High Adventure, School Breaks, Prom, Pow Wow, WB, Awards Events, Fundraising Events, OA Work Weeks.
 Scouting has so much to offer!







Planning and Scheduling #2

- Many units start tracking heavy duty Eagle requirements with the first MB earned. To complete Eagle before the 18th birthday means earlier ranks need to be completed in time to allow for the next rank's required time of service. An Eagle Extension is rarely granted, special problems.
- MBs are balanced between Scout Requests, Electives and Eagle Required. Easier MBs at first and then tougher ones.
- Advancement Chairs stay in touch with the SM Team (SM and ASMs) to be sure the theme of the campouts, activities and MBs are what the Scouts need at this time.
- Recruit MBCs if you see a specific MB is needed soon. We can arrange MBs themes in GSW-Y South and North. There are many MBCs available through Scout Book. They are vetted at their home Council.


